


ANNUAL REPORT 2016

HUMANE DOG MANAGEMENT PROGRAMME launched with an objective of creating a healthy, reduced stray dog population in Lalitpur through Animal Birth Control/Anti Rabies and Mobile Treatments and Residential Rehabilitation Care.

Under the Humane Dog Management Programme, we initiated spay/neuter and treatment programme for Lumbini. We hope to continue our work at the birth place of the lord Buddha, the epitome of compassion. And all these was possible through our partnership with Lumbini Social Service Foundation and specially Venerable Metteya who has also started a small sanctuary for needy animals and we were really happy to be part of his first horse rescue. Animal Nepal are partnering with LSSF as technical partners. Under our ongoing programme at Lalitpur and Kirtipuir we are happy to say that we managed to spay and neuter 1,290 dogs. We also conducted a CNVR camp at Godavari and Pharping. Vaccination camps were held at Chobar, Jalbinayak and Swyambhu.

In 2017 we intend to work with dog breeders and pet shop owners as the market is being flooded with puppies of different breeds and we are also seeing an increase in the number of pets that are abandoned on the streets. We hope to be able to educate the public about responsible pet ownership and the breeder and pet shop owners about responsible breeding and selling. We also hope to work with the government to come up with breeding standards. We plan to intensively work with communities and students to promote animal welfare issues.

Animal Nepal has managed to strengthen our advocacy programme. In this respect, we organized a consultative meeting on animal welfare law review, campaigned against cruel buffalo transportation, published a report on national and international legal instruments addressing animal welfare in Nepal and hired a new advocacy officer. We are also proud to have been a part of a process whereby Tiger tops private limited, one of the oldest resorts in Nepal decided to adopt responsible elephant tourism by going chain free and ending elephant polo.

I am very pleased to share with you the 2016 Annual Report of Animal Nepal, which is not just a report but a reflection of the hard work of our team and the significant impact the work has on so many deserving animals.

2016 started out as a challenging year. While aftershocks from the 2015 earthquake continued to unsettle us, a political conflict led to a blockade at the Indian border. With no goods being imported, and very limited petrol available, our work was severely affected.

Despite these setbacks, the team successfully managed to accomplish the planned tasks of the year. Under the Humane Dog Population Management Program, 1290 dogs were sterilized. By the end of the year an additional 1090 dog were vaccinated and treated. Animal Nepal further managed to organise CNVR or spay camps at two Buddhist pilgrimage places: Lumbini and Pharping.


As part of our ongoing advocacy program, several meetings were organized at the district level

at Lalitpur. The team organized field visits for related government stakeholders. The biggest achievement however was the drafting of the Working Animals Directive under the Department of Livestock. We are quite proud of the fact that Nepal's working animals, including equines, cows and buffaloes, yaks and mountain goats, will soon be legally protected!

Another major accomplishment thanks to our suggestions and connections was the fact that, Tiger Tops, Nepal's oldest safari outfit, became Asia's first private responsible elephant tourism resort. The resort introduced chain free enclosure and now offers 'non-contact elephant tourism', where safaris and bathing of elephants by tourists have been replaced with observational and supportive activities.

This year too, we published a number of important documents, including "National and International Legal Instrument Addressing Animal Welfare in Nepal". All these documents can be found on our website: animalnepal.org

Animal Nepal sterilised 54 dogs and vaccinated 70 dogs during the CNVR camp at Badikhel in coordination with local authorities of Godavari. The newly built isolation unit of our donkey sanctuary turned into a surgery room where AN vets Atish Yadav, Sunil Thapa and Krishna Kumar Yadav carried out their surgery for 3 days where our dedicated technicians Santosh Shrestha and Kushal BC assisted them.

10 ULLENS SCHOOL visits AN Treatment Center



Besides news, every week an online ad is published that will inform people about the animal welfare issues and work of Animal Nepal.

The event started at 11 am with visitors offering their blessings to our rescued dogs followed by stray dog feeding and de flea programme at Chobar. We also had an adoption programme where people could adopt a mixed breed dog from our shelter. 2 healthy dogs were adopted from our shelter on that day. The adopters were provided with adoption certificates, dog health cards, cute dog belts, and free treatment service for one year.

08 AN Conducts CNVR CAMP AT LUMBINI





The highest and most universal ideal of Buddhism "love for all living beings" came to life on November when group of amazing people joined hands to treat the sick animals, feed the starving ones and put an END to the suffering of dogs of Lumbini, the birth place of Gutama Buddha. 101 dogs were spayed or neutered, vaccinated against rabies and more than 50 dogs were treated against skin disease in 4 days CNVR Camp organised by Animal Nepal and Lumbini Social Service Foundation (LSSF). During our stay, we even rescued a wounded and abandoned horse from Kapilvastu. During the camp we also got an oppertunity to conduct an education session at Karuna Girls School of Lumbini.

19 AN Conducts CNVR CAMP AT PHARPING



With 64 dogs spayed in just three days, Animal Nepal made a real difference in the lives of dogs and peoples of Pharping on December. Besides, we did a measurable good in a community by educating 150 students and teachers of Tribhuvan Adarsha Higher Secondary School. Animal Nepal is very grateful to Kyabje Chatral Sangye Dorje Rinpoche's monastery for providing us a venue and hospitality to conduct a dog spay and treatment camp in Pharping later this month. 04 Preventing Illness Through a New ISOLATION SETUP





With the kind support from Mayhew International, our new isolation unit is finally completed on December. For a treatment center like ours, where we rescue and treat no less than a 1000 dogs every year, an isolation setup was vital for the prevention of the spread of epidemic diseases among the dogs. We believe that the death rate will eventually decrease at our shelter and more lives will be saved with the establishment of this unit. Our isolation ward consists of 10 kennels which have a separate room for mange, cancer dogs and dogs with other communicable diseases.

The kennels are built in such a way that they are easy to clean and disinfect. Special ventilation system has been applied in order to help control spreading of diseases. The care takers and shelter workers are provided with gloves and boots which they can use while cleaning the area. Furthermore, the area will be disinfected on a regular basis to help prevent potentially infectious diseases.

The building also has an examination room where the rescued dogs will be diagnosed firsthand before shifting them to their respective kennels. The dogs in our isolation unit will receive intensive care from our vets and staff on a regular basis. The isolation unit also work as a "quarantine area" which is extremely important for dogs who are simply being observed to be sure they are healthy before they are released back to their own communities.



ANIMAL BIRTH CONTROL (ABC) PROGRAMME



In 2016 we aimed to spay and neuter 1000 dogs from inside Lalitpur. We were able to spay a total of 1,290 dogs inside Lalitpur sub-metropolitan city and neighboring areas through our CNVR camps. The spay and neuter surgeries are conducted at Chobar Animal Treatment Center which has a capacity of 12 kennels and an extra isolation unit.

Dogs are chosen from a specific community of our working area. The area is divided according to the map of the LSMC. A pre- community education programme is conducted a day before catching the dogs, where the public is made aware about the importance of spaying and neutering, and education materials are distributed in the community regarding the same. The next day a team of dog catchers which include para-vets, caretakers and volunteers go into the area to catch dogs and are then taken to the treatment center. The observation and recovery period for the dogs is a total of 3 days at the treatment center. Each spayed and neutered dog is given an ear notch

and a collar (when available) before being released to the location where they were picked up from, for future recognition.

Animal Nepal is often requested by local authorities and individuals from other parts of Nepal to conduct CNVR camps. In 2016 we conducted 4 such camps in Badikhel, Chapagaun, Lumbini and Pharping. Animal Nepal conducts such camps with support from the locals and government authorities whenever possible.

ANTI RABIES VACCINATION (ARV) PROGRAMME



AN has been annually vaccinating the street dogs of Lalitpur and the south - western part of Kathmandu valley against Rabies under its Humane Dog Management Programme. Animal Nepal also organises vaccination camps in rabies outbreak together with local government authorities and local youth groups. In 2016 we were able to vaccinate a total of 1,996 dogs from inside and outside LSMC. We have till now conducted 9 vaccination camps at Chobar, Jalbinayak,

Patan, Lumbini, Chapagaun, Swayambhu, Pharping, Badikhel and Lumbini.

Besides conducting vaccination camps in communities, we also vaccinate dogs that enter our treatment center. Vaccinations are also provided to dogs by the mobile response team if they find a volunteer to keep the vaccination record. During such camps we make people aware about the importance of rabies vaccinations and also provide free vaccination

for their pets which encourages them to participate in this yearly campaign.

There is a notion amongst the public that a dog turns rabid the moment it starts frothing from the mouth which is not true and could be due to other reasons. So we educate the community about symptoms of rabies to prevent the dog from getting beaten to death considered to be rabid.

TREATMENT OF SICK & INJURED DOGS



Like every year Animal Nepal divided its treatment into shelter and mobile treatment. With 543 dogs treated through mobile clinics and 771 dogs treated through shelter treatments, AN this year treated a total of 1,314 dogs from various parts of Lalitpur. In all, we have 2 vets and 3 technicians working at the shelter for treatment of sick and injured dogs and one vet technician for our mobile response team. For the emergency treatment Animal

Nepal operates one Ambulance and a Mobulance that runs inside Lalitpur throughout the day. Each day we receive 10 to 15 calls regarding sick and injured dogs. Messages are also received through our facebook page which is operated by the head office. The head office receives calls and we forward this information to either the hospital teams or the mobile response team. Learning the complexity of the cases we forward the case to either

the hospital team or the mobile treatment team.

Our mobile treatment handles emergency cases and CTVT cases on the street. In recent years we have been experimenting with treating as many cases as possible on the streets. This has been highly effective and shown positive results. Only the most difficult and untreatable cases are taken to the Chobar Treatment Center.

DOG ADOPTION PROGRAMME

76 Dog Adopted AAA





In 2016 we were able to provide loving homes to 76 homeless puppies and few adult dogs. Animal Nepal promotes adoption of local Nepali dog (strays found on the streets) as the most apt dog to have. Although many people prefer pure breeds, we encourage people to take in a stray as they carry strong genes, adapt much better to local conditions and require very little veterinary intervention.

We also offer free treatment for a year, free spaying, neutering, rabies vaccination and deworming. AN has developed small booklets on Puppy and dog care which is also available online. We also post adoption advertisements in our adoption page. In 2016 we had aimed to get at least 40 dogs adopted.

EDUCATION & AWARENESS PROGRAMME

400+ Students Reached





At Animal Nepal, we believe, education is the key. Since animal welfare is an emerging concept in our country, the community and especially the children still need to be educated about its importance and long-term impact. Schools from Kathmandu are often invited to our treatment center where they learn about the programme and the issues of stray dogs and other animals. This way, most schools in Patan have already been introduced to our Animal Birth Control and Anti Rabies programme and make them aware about the suffering of stray dogs in general. However, we

aim to expand and make it better by taking our school education programme to a whole new level.

This year we were able to reach more than 400 students from various school. During the course of the CNVR camp at Lumbini, we got an opportunity to spend an afternoon with 150 lovely students from Karuna Girls School. Another school education programme was conducted during a CNVR camp at Pharping. More than 60 students from Tribhuvan Adarsha Higher Secondary School gathered together to get information/education on animals

and their welfare. Furthermore, the kids were also taught about responsible pet ownership. Often, they are unaware of animal abuse that are taking place around their locality and homes.

In our educational campaign, our major focus remains on teaching the students about the five freedoms of animals and why we should not violate them. We also encourage them to act on their own and if they discover cases of animal abuse we provide them with a helpline number for an immediate response.









the medication for next two days. On the third day, after assuring that no contagious disease apparent in Bunu, she was then shifted to puppy kennel along with other. The medications was still continued. One week after. she showed an excellent recovery and response to medications. She started developing partial weight lifting ability on the affected leg. Very little pain was still evident so pain killer dose continued. Her wound was completely covered with fresh tissue. Antibiotic was stopped from this stage but the wound dressing continued.

15 days later, Bunu gained normal weight bearing ability on her affected leg with completely healed wound. Her gait was little unsteady due to deformed joint and scar of wound was the only visible sign of her previous lesion. She was happy to play with other puppies and roam around the shelter.

A TAIL WORTH TAILING!

Bunu, a 2 month old puppy was brought to shelter at the end of May. She was hit hard by a vehicle. Physical examination revealed a severe injury on front right limb at distal joint region.

She was not able to bear any weight with the affected leg and visible lameness was seen. The

site had open wound of about 3 cm diameter and deep seated involving the joint structures. She had severe pain on palpation.

On the first day of her entry to shelter, she was kept quarantined along with pain killer, antibiotics and simple splint applied to immobilize the joint. She received On 26th June, 2016 despite of having unsteady gait, her cuteness caught the eye of Pritesh Raj Acharya from Chabahil, who came for visit at shelter and on the very date adopted her. With lots of wishes we bid a sweet farewell to Bunu for her happy home stay at her forever home. We advised the owner for revisit at shelter for the follow up treatment. After 10 days of vaccination and re-checkup, we were happy to see Bunu with excellent health condition.

BURDEN FREE EVER AFTER!



Nanimaya, a dog with about 1.5 kg tumor was rescued from Teku area. Locals reported that the dog lived with the large tumor hanging down her body for more than a month. She was normal with vitals and behavior on the day of shelter entry. A biopsy sample of the hanging mass was send to the laboratory for the diagnosis of the tumor type. Our volunteer Sharmila Kumal made this case as her internship case study. Her study needed the biopsy report which revealed a metastatic tumor but confined to one area only. She didn't showed any other systemic illness and we planned for her surgery after 4 days of shelter entry. The surgery went well. She received the postoperative antibiotics and pain killer for next 5 days. She had her stitches removed after 12 days of surgery. Till then the dog started exploring the shelter with normal walk and behavior. She was released after 3 weeks of surgical removal of tumor to the area where she belong. Now she is living her happy and burden free life at her own community.

TIME CAN HEAL ALMOST ANYTHING!

Bhunte was rescued with a road accident case. Our examination revealed a lacerated wound on and around the face and also found a deep pus in the forehead. His wound was cleared with antiseptics and all the accumulated pus in the forehead was drained away. A minor surgery was required to drain the pus which was done under sedation with Xylazine. After the surgery, the eye ball looked intact but Bunte's eyelids were closed due to the wound just above his eyes. Bhunte received pain killers, antibiotics and e-collar as medications. Pus was being drained manually for the next two days till there were no traces of pus being accumulated. The lacerated wound started healing and appeared good after one week of treatment. The hair started to grow after 15 days of the treatment and even the pus accumulated wound appeared very small and healed. The dog was completely fine and sent back to the same place after 25 days of care and treatment.





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




